Developing an **Arts and Recreation Center** for people of all incomes.

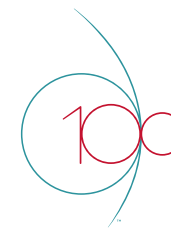
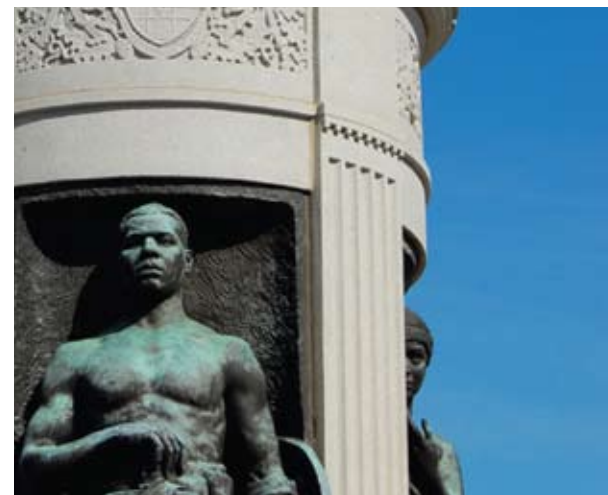

**QUAD COMMUNITIES:
FROM CIVIL WAR TO CIVIL RIGHTS
AND BEYOND**

- 1. Quinn Chapel**, home of Chicago's oldest African-American congregation, now undergoing major restoration. *2401 S. Wabash Avenue*
- 2. Walk of Fame**, a 1.5 mile stretch featuring 91 bronze plaques commemorating famous residents such as Sammy Davis, Jr. and Louis Armstrong. *King Drive between 25th and 35th Streets*
- 3. Olivet Baptist Church**, which played an important role in the Great Migration. *3101 S. King Drive*
- 4. Camp Douglas/Douglas Tomb**, former site of a Civil War prisoner of war camp and the tomb of Stephen Douglas. *Bounded by 31st and 35th, King Drive and Cottage Grove Avenue*
- 5. Black Metropolis Convention & Tourism Council/ Bronzeville Visitor Information Center**, a point of access and orientation for tourists, residents and researchers. *3501 S. King Drive*
- 6. Oakwood Shores**, more than 3,000 new market-rate, affordable and low-income homes being built as part of the Chicago Housing Authority's Plan for Transformation. *37th to Pershing, Langley to Lake Park*
- 7. Drexel Boulevard**, one of Chicago's historic tree-lined boulevards. *Drexel from Oakwood to 51st*
- 8. President Barack Obama Residence**, the Chicago home of the 44th President of the United States. *5046 S. Greenwood Avenue*
- 9. South Side Community Art Center**, operated continuously since its founding in the 1930s by the Works Progress Administration, is an influential force in the development of African-American artists. *3831 S. Michigan Avenue*
- 10. Wendell Phillips High School**, whose notable alumni include Nat "King" Cole; Dinah Washington; John Johnson, founder of Johnson Publishing; and Alonzo Parham, the first African-American to attend West Point. *244 E. Pershing Road*
